#### **Overall Comments**

### **Assessment potential**

I understand your aim is to go for the Photography Degree and that you plan to submit your work for assessment at the end of this course. From the work you have shown in this assignment, providing you commit yourself to the course, I believe you have the potential to pass at assessment. In order to meet all the assessment criteria, there are certain areas you will need to focus on, which I will outline in my feedback.

# Feedback on assignment

Demonstration of technical and Visual Skills, Quality of Outcome, Demonstration of Creativity

Below are the key points from our discussion:

- I agree the brief starts off a little ambiguously but the last sentence of paragraph 2, 'there is no right answer, so experiment' allows you enough wriggle room.
- The overall goal is for students to think about and attempt making a themed series of portraits and you have successfully done that here.
- Michael commented that if he had done the assignment again, he would have worked to make the concept clearer in terms of the pictorial strategy.
- When you note that you have 'reservations about the images in his books World's in a small room', can you elaborate (referring to Irving Penn's work). If you already have

- then add a link to that analysis to the submission post as it will help link your practice with your wider research.
- Regarding Bailey's comment, it is important to note that he is talking about what is interesting to him (and that which has made him a very wealthy household name...)
- A tip for creating white backgrounds is to light it. It would be easier to draw or show that describe, but set a lamp or flash aimed at the backdrop, perhaps 2 (1 each side and behind your subject to not effect the lighting on them). You then light your subject far enough away so as to not be in the way of the backdrop lights or cause any shadow (which you shouldn't if everything is set up well). Light the subject with a light either side of the subject at about 45 degrees and set to slightly different power settings, or a lamp on one side and reflector on the other. You can also then backlight the subject if needed by adding an extra light behind the subject to mimic the effect you've created in these images.
- I felt the work would benefit from captions, more specifically, the names of the subjects. You could stick with first names if privacy is a concern but it is important to think about giving the subject power and identity in the photographer-subject, and viewer-subject relationships. By giving them their names, you are identifying them as individuals rather than models for your message.
- Farming keeping consistent works and although unusual I don't have any issue with the landscape orientation as long as there is a purpose in your strategy.
- I agree with your technical reflection and only wish to add that I wouldn't be overly hard on yourself. The images work as a series, so well done. Location lighting isn't easy and takes practice, so take the lesson learnt here and refine your process at later opportunities. Try to think about the lighting of the subjects and how contrast in monochrome can be used to bring out, or emphasise, physical characteristics.
